DOC Tahr cull and research/monitoring update



NZDA attended a recent Tahr Plan Implementation Liaison Group meeting in Christchurch on Tuesday, 15th December 2020. We were represented by Dave Keen, NZDA Tahr Rep, and Gwyn Thurlow, CEO.

The meeting was to receive the result of DOC's official control operations and discuss the Department's 2021 (and beyond) research and monitoring initiatives.

DOC, together with LINZ, have completed a survey to ascertain the number of tahr present on Crown Pastoral Lease land. That survey was carried out in October and November using a fixed-wing plane with high resolution camera technology. The results will be known early in the New Year.

DOC have decided to monitor nine sites to assess the vegetation in plots located on public land. Monitoring of these plots will be carried out over three years. The field work will commence January/February 2021, being the first year. DOC will report back in 2023-24 once all the sites have been assessed, but we expect annual data to be available each year.

The NZDA welcomes this because we have been calling for scientific input for a number of years.

DOC are also looking into a method to best count tahr for surveying tahr numbers annually. In the interim, NZDA has been told at the meeting that DOC will do aerial counts across key sites starting in 2021. These counts are essential to justify and frame-up Official intervention levels which are triggers by tahr densities in the management units.

NZDA has heard many reports that tahr have been heavily culled in areas accessible to recreational hunters, diminishing the recreational experiences of hunters, and so we will work closely with DOC to communicate those locations and request that DOC takes a more targeted and research-backed approach when preparing its 2021-22 "Official" intervention plans.

NZDA will continue to be the voice of recreational hunters by attending DOC's tahr group meetings and be a two-way intermediary for the

concerns of our members, but also pass on what we have learnt from DOC to our members.

Venison Bolognese - An Amazing Recipe to Try Over the Holidays

Venison is a staple amongst our members and those in need who have received wild Wapiti meat courtesy of the FWF, NZDA & The New Zealand Food Network.

NZDA teamed up with Dariush from Cazador - Game food restaurant, who has put together this Venison Bolognese recipe for you to try at home!

Venison mince is amazing stuff! It has more depth of flavour than your average beef mince. It makes for excellent burger patties, mince pies, kebabs and meatballs.

Here is a quick, super tasty bastardisation of an Italian classic. Don't overthink it, let your instincts take over and cook using all of your senses.

Venison bolognese (serves 4)

Venison mince is amazing stuff! More depth of flavour than your average beef mince.

It makes excellent burger patties, mince pies, kebabs and meatballs.

This is a quick, super tasty bastardisation of an Italian classic. Don't overthink it, let your instincts take over and cook using all your senses.

Ingredients:

500g dried spaghetti
500g venison mince
30g butter
30ml olive oil
1 medium onion (finely chopped)
1/2 carrot (finely chopped)
1/2 stick of celery (finely chopped)
2 cloves garlic (finely chopped)
1 teaspoon ground coriander
1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
1 Tablespoon tomato paste
1 tin of tomatoes (chopped)
handful of Italian parsley (chopped)
splash extra virgin olive oil (optional)
50g parmesan

Method:

Brown mince in a hot casserole with oil and butter. Cook the mince in batches if you have to - Don't overcrowd the pan!

The worst thing you can do is rush this step as you'll end up boiling the meat.

Remove the mince from the pan with a slotted spoon but leave oil and butter.

Add onion, garlic, celery and carrot.

Stir with a wooden spoon to get all the caramelised bits off the bottom of the pan.

Turn the heat down to medium.

Cook until the vegetables have softened (about 5 minutes)

Boil a big pot of salted water for your pasta.

Add the spice and tomato paste to the vegetables and cook for a further 3 minutes stirring so it doesn't burn.

Add the tomatoes and mince back to the pan.

Cook for about 15 minutes until the sauce is nice and thick. Turn the heat down if it's bubbling too much.

Taste the sauce for seasoning. Add salt and pepper if needed.

Cook your pasta while the sauce finishes. When the pasta is just cooked, strain it and mix into the bolognese sauce with the parsley.

Serve and finish with good olive oil and parmesan cheese.

Enjoy with good friends.





- Rifle must be a factory hunter style non heavy barrel type, hunter type stock. May have an aftermarket barrel (eg Trueflight) as long as it is a hunting profile not heavy (Bull)
- Trigger weight no lighter than 1.5 pounds
- No scope restrictions
- No target gear, eg shooting jacket, pants, shoes, gloves, etc. Only a shooting matt.
