A Word from our Chief Executive

July has been a busy month for NZDA and myself.

Firstly, we have had many new members join NZDA and I welcome you all and thank you for becoming an active part of New Zealand's hunting community. Your membership helps make our voice stronger.



The National Office team are now at Deerstalkers House in our modern office. We packed up the temporary office and moved in over three days, a large and disruptive task for staff and members alike.

The lead up to Conference was a juggling act of completing the building redevelopment, distributing the paper work to branches and delegates for Conference, coordinating national competition entries, arranging for the IT and AV equipment to host the Zoom meeting, and answering many member questions.

I was also tasked with launching the re-branch by the National Executive on the eve of Conference. Like our membership, the re-brand was a surprise to me. My initial response was "why change a great logo" but the more I thought about the versatility and purpose of the new branding I have come to embrace it. It is suitable for these times, digital use, and looks great in print format as well as on clothing.

I have been working closely with the Tahr Foundation and David Keen, NZDA Tahr rep, on the 2020/21 DOC Operational Tahr Plan. I plunged into the deep end attending the DOC meeting in Christchurch, then

was closley engaged with the Tahr Foundation's legal action to seek an injunction and judicial review. As a passionate tahr hunter, I have a vested interest in the outcome and will work hard for our members to ensure recreational hunters' views are heard. I was present at the High Court in Wellington and learnt the value of information and data.

Staying on the subject of tahr, I was proud to be a hunter when 1000 people and around 500 vehicles attended the TahrJam protest at Mt Cook. I am also proud to see a second hunter-lead TahrJam protest happening in Auckland.

You will have seen I have issued many media releases, spoken about hunting issues on the airwaves, been quoted in Parliament, and appeared (albeit briefly) on TV One News last Friday. I have put lot of effort to raise the provide of hunting and NZDA in New Zealand, and will continue to do so for our membership.
