National Board Reports

My highlight this month was attending a meeting in Alexandra to support the formation of a new NZDA Branch to be called New Zealand Deerstalkers Association Central Otago Branch.



With the necessary support and commitment from local Alexandra hunters the process of establishing the branch is well underway and we will welcome the 49th branch into the Association soon.

It was nice to see the interest and then the agreement that forming a branch was a good idea and the benefits being part of a larger collective would bring to all. At the pointy end of the stick that is what we are all about and I was honoured to be able to speak to the group and answer questions they had.

It was also good to finally get a face to face meeting with most of the board in Wellington 18 September. Callum and Dan had to attend electronically being based in Auckland, and I thank them both for the effort. Seven and a half hours online while the house moves around you is not something any of us particularly enjoy but it is fortunate we have these systems so progress can still be made. We had a productive meeting that again propelled us forward. Carolyn and Gwyn were able to fully update everyone on the state of the Association's finances and progress against our Business Plan. Budget preparation is under way and review of the business plan taking place alongside. Growth in membership is a key point and it is satisfying to see engagement increasing across the

country.



Last week applicants for the HUNTS trainer roles were interviewed by Rob Howey and Stephen Small with myself sitting in on 3 nights as well. Quite an effort for everyone involved and really exciting to see the calibre and interest of those putting their names forward. At times in this organisation you find yourself questioning what it takes to keep things going but through an experience like these interviews you soon find yourself in awe of our volunteers and those willing to give to the greater good. Thank you to all who applied for the positions and while the work is not yet done a big thanks to Rob and Stephen for their commitment of time to conduct the interviews into the evening. Further interviews with Gwyn are yet to happen but the process is well along the way now.

Firearms law and regulations continues to be a huge area of discussion, angst and unknowns. I know a lot of people in all firearms related sports

are finding the process of getting to the point where we actually have clear guidance incredibly frustrating. Add into that additional work around firearms safety more broadly and there is a huge amount of effort across New Zealand Police and all the firearms sport bodies to try to distill down all of this to a workable framework. Our understanding is that a pilot program for range inspection certification is to take place late October or early November and from that will flow the training, processes and procedures required to complete range certification. On Friday Dan and I were in on an electronic meeting of Police, GAC, MSC, Professional Guides Association and Federated Farmers discussing firearm safety. The shared views from those discussions should be really helpful in assisting both Police and GAC, who have statutory roles, to provide guidance and material for distribution to all firearm users to enhance safety in using firearms. It was a broad ranging discussion but picked up on some interesting points where opportunities may have been lost over time for varied reasons.

A regional meeting was held in Wellington at Deerstalkers House on 19 September and most of the board who could stayed on overnight to attend. As always with these discussions points of real interest were brought up and hopefully those present went away much more informed around matters from the association side and the board gained some valuable insights into what is important to the branches. On Saturday a regional meeting was held in Tinwald and again a very good wide ranging discussion was held that covered many aspects of what branches are experiencing or wondering about. Notes from these meetings will be distributed to all as a way of informing but also prompting further discussion if necessary. The most important aspect of these meetings is branches coming together and seeing the value that can come from having conversations. One message that is coming through loudly from all involved is that we do not speak to one another often enough and we seem scared to share what our branches are doing. We need to be more sharing of our adventures and work within community, we belong for a reason and why not share that with others so they can decide if they wish to share in that.

Freezer filling is a priority at present, be safe and watch the weather. Consider what is best for the habitat when selecting that animal.

Following on from last month's report, the month of September saw our first Game Animal Management committee meeting

(GAM). Items on the agenda included nationwide aerial poisoning, nationwide goat control and deer control, each in connection with DOC.



Poison operations were discussed in depth in the context of allocating deer repellent. Only a limited number of NZDA board members are given access to the upcoming proposed poison areas and we discussed these areas during the meeting. I want to let members know NZDA is working on a plan to recommend to DOC our preferred areas for deer repellent use, however unfortunately there is not enough available for the total number of areas proposed, currently 50,000 hectares are allocated for repellent use for DOC operations. The GAM committee will focus on RHA's, herds of special interest first and foremost, and areas of high recreational hunting importance.

Gwyn, our CEO, and Craig, National President, both represent NZDA on consultation meetings with DOC and so GAM will give them the best information possible to advocate in the best interest of hunters.

Daylight saving has arrived and my first spring hunting trip was canned due to rubbish weather. I'm rescheduling that now and with a bit of luck I'll get out for a trout fish on the 1st somewhere up in the hills.

We had our first post-Conference board meeting on the 18th of September. We talked about progress on establishing the new subcommittees and our hope that over the coming 1-2 years these will progressively:

- Create a larger pool of subcommittee volunteers

- Allow the Board to delegate more hunting and shooting related work
- Create a bigger pool of potential Board members so we have better the succession planning options
- Deliver some more consistency, where appropriate, to how the various subcommittees operate.

These are worthy overall objectives to strive for in addition to the specific work and outcomes we seek from each subcommittee.

We commenced the 2022/23 FY Business Planning & Budgeting process with the Board. I'm working on the initial draft with Morgan and Gwyn, and this should be back as draft to the Board in December and then out to branches for any input with the final plan approved by the Board in February.

We also as a Board talked about workloads across the NZDA system. There is no one silver bullet and there are a range of actions already underway to try and achieve a better balance over time.

Hopefully subcommittees as we envisage them operating will help spread some of the load, there is a structural review of national office underway that will bring more employee resources online, the business planning process will also look out over a longer time horizon to spread workloads. I presented to the board at a recent meeting and it was great to note we are rapidly approaching 9,000 active members. Some branches have grown by 30%. Please welcome all the new faces you see at club nights and events. Being a Deerstalker is all about people and bringing likeminded folk together.

I will be doing a HUNTS Course starting Monday evening, to learn first hand all about what we are sharing with our trainees. There's lots of exciting things happening with HUNTS and I am personally taking the opportunity to upskill over the next 3 years to become an Instructor. I have reached the stage in my hunting career where I want to give something back and help new hunters get the skills and confidence to experience our backcountry in the way I have. I will share my journey with you over the coming newsletters.



I took a week off in September spring hunting in the Nelson Lakes area with a couple of Wellington branch members, Tim and Rick, and a non-member, Josh. We had a superb trip together, enjoyed adventure, successes, rain and snow, and visiting new places. If it wasn't for the NZDA, I would have never meet the 3 fine blokes I spent my time with. I achieved a personal career hunting highlight by securing a trophy chamois buck - his horns are 10 5/8" with 3 7/8" bases, to give a unofficial Douglas Score of 29. It's a buck of a lifetime. I'll have to save the full story for an issue of NZ Hunting & Wildlife Magazine one day in the future. We also stayed at [Nelson Branch's Red Deer Lodge](#) at Lake Rotoiti. It's a place steeped in deerstalking history and an ideal place to take a NZDA branch club hunt to - there's red deer and chamois to hunt, plus trout fishing in the lakes. The Nelson committee were doing a working bee and so we helped out too. In one trip, it summed up what's special about NZDA and highlighted the more you put in, the more you get out.




- 1) Go to Google play or the Apple store and search for **NZ Deerstalkers**. Select **Install** or **GET**.




- 2) Once installed, either open via the app or click open. Once in the app,



Recreational Hunting & Shooting during Lockdown



Covid continues to impact NZDA activities, especially in the Auckland region, Level 2 is when club level activities can occur as you cannot mix 'bubbles' at Level 3 or Level 4.

Hunting During Level 4

Recreational hunting is not permitted or practical during Alert Level 4.

One of the primary reasons recreational activities such as hunting are off the cards during alert Level 4, is that when things do go wrong, the emergency response often involves a large number of people from multiple bubbles which increases the risk of community transmission and unnecessarily puts more people at risk.

In addition, all DOC facilities are closed under Level 4.

While it may be common to think "it won't happen to me", sometimes it just does.

Hunting During Level 3

Alert Level 3 means COVID-19 is within the community, but:

- Hunting is allowed on both private land and public conservation land in Level 3. However, you must stay within your region and stick to your bubble.
- Overnight trips are not allowed.
- You can only hunt on foot — using quad bikes, off-road bikes, helicopters and other motorised vehicles is not allowed.
- Local regulations must be followed at all times, i.e. DOC permit terms or regional council access terms.
- Land owner permission is required, and you cannot mix bubbles so it creates a technical issue accessing private land that's not part of your bubble.

- All DOC huts, campsites, lodges and toilets remain closed at Level 3.
- Please check with your branch officials first, but the recommendations are that all NZDA Ranges should remain closed and club activities are not practical due to mixing of bubbles.

Hunting During Level 2

Alert Level 2 means there are or may be COVID-19 cases in the community, but the situation is largely under control.

- Hunting is generally allowed.
- Overnight trips and fly-ins are okay.
- NZDA facilities and events are okay to re-open / occur, check in first with branch officials. There are guidelines to follow that may be too impractical to manage for some branches/events run by volunteers.
- DOC facilities are fully open, including visitor centres, huts, campsites and toilets.
- Bookings for accommodation can continue to be made.

Hunting During Level 1

At Alert Level 1, everyone can enjoy the great outdoors and branch activities provided it is done safely.

- NZDA facilities re-opened and events can happen.
- DOC facilities will be fully open without restrictions.

NIWA Parks Weather | Additional forecast sites now live

There are now an additional 22 locations with weather forecast information live on the website, bringing the total number of forecasts available to 71. (Arthur's Pass Visitor Centre has also been added to the initial list of 21 locations).

DOC worked with NIWA on a new and improved 'Summary' feature for each Park and location page. This feature allows visitors to get forecast information condensed into a format that can be printed or saved on a phone to allow access outside of cell phone coverage.

Thanks to data provided by Mountain Safety Council, a summary of the relevant avalanche advisory can now be viewed on [NIWA Parks Weather](#).





Counter Terrorism Bill

Report back from Committee

In May 2021, the Government introduced the Counter-Terrorism Legislation Bill. This bill amends three Acts:

- A) the Terrorism Suppression Act 2002;
- B) the Search and Surveillance Act 2012; and
- C) the Terrorism Suppression (Control Orders) Act 2019.

In the opinion of COLFO's legal advisor, the Bill (as reported from Select Committee) would not specifically affect firearms owners. However, they have outlined below some areas where firearms owners' activity could be captured by the Bill.

OSPRI's TBfree programme is continuing to innovate and improve its operational effectiveness with the successful trialling of aerial low sow baiting and deer repellent bait at Molesworth National Park.

This winter at Molesworth and adjoining private land, the animal disease management agency completed two 1080 aerial operations over 70,000 hectares and the outcomes were excellent for possum control and deer survival in the high-country environment.

"A recent aerial cull of 80 feral deer from an Otago farm indicates a burgeoning game animal and feral pest problem."

"The biggest increase appears to be in feral deer, due to a collapse of venison prices and restricted hunter access, and wallabies, where the Government last year allocated \$27.4 million over four years to eradicate the pest."

"The New Zealand Deerstalkers Association (NZDA) and the Game Animal Council (GAC), which encourage the sustainable management of deer, tahr and chamois, say numbers are not yet out of control but are calling for landowners to improve hunting access and for changes to the management of feral deer herds."



In the News: Wairarapa woman is hunter, forager and one of our only wahine Māori winemakers

Being one of the few Māori women winemakers in Aotearoa New Zealand, Rickards has a strong interest in foraged eating-plants, from watercress to nettle. Hunting deer and other introduced animal species is just part of the package. Her own personal wine label is named Huntress.

"Last week I saw a yearling in the bush but it just looked at me... and I had a connecting moment with this animal. I didn't need to shoot it – and maybe I should have for environmental reasons – but it was just that morning, and the energy, and it looked at me and I looked at it, and it took off..."

Tui Keenan was a police officer until about 2010. She left policing to work with the force's family harm team. Around this time, her husband Comrie introduced her to hunting and the benefits of living off the land, and it completely changed her life and perspective.

Now the family rarely if ever buys veges, and never buys meat. Their freezer is usually stocked full of cuts she and Comrie have hunted and butchered themselves.

One family that has already felt the benefit of full freezers and a connection with the land are the Reedy's.


